COMMISSIONER PATTY SHEEHAN TO DISTRIBUTE FREE BACK TO SCHOOL SUPPLIES TO REEVES TERRACE CHILDREN

ORLANDO, FL (August 14, 2008) – Orlando City Commissioner Patty Sheehan will be giving away free back-to-school supplies to the children living in the Reeves Terrace public housing community. **The school supply giveaway will be Friday, August 15, 2008 from 5:30pm until 6:30pm at the Reeves Terrace Neighborhood Recreation Center at 150 McJordan Avenue.** Commissioner Sheehan, in partnership with, and through the generous, financial sponsorship of, **The Carroll Adams Group**, will be providing free backpacks filled with school supplies to all elementary and middle school children, ages 5 through 12, registered as living in Reeves. “The children living in Reeves Terrace are some of Orlando’s neediest and brightest,” Commissioner Sheehan said. “These are children who aren’t always afforded the best and whose parents do not have the financial means, especially in today’s tough, economic climate, to equip them with the necessary tools to tackle going back to school.
